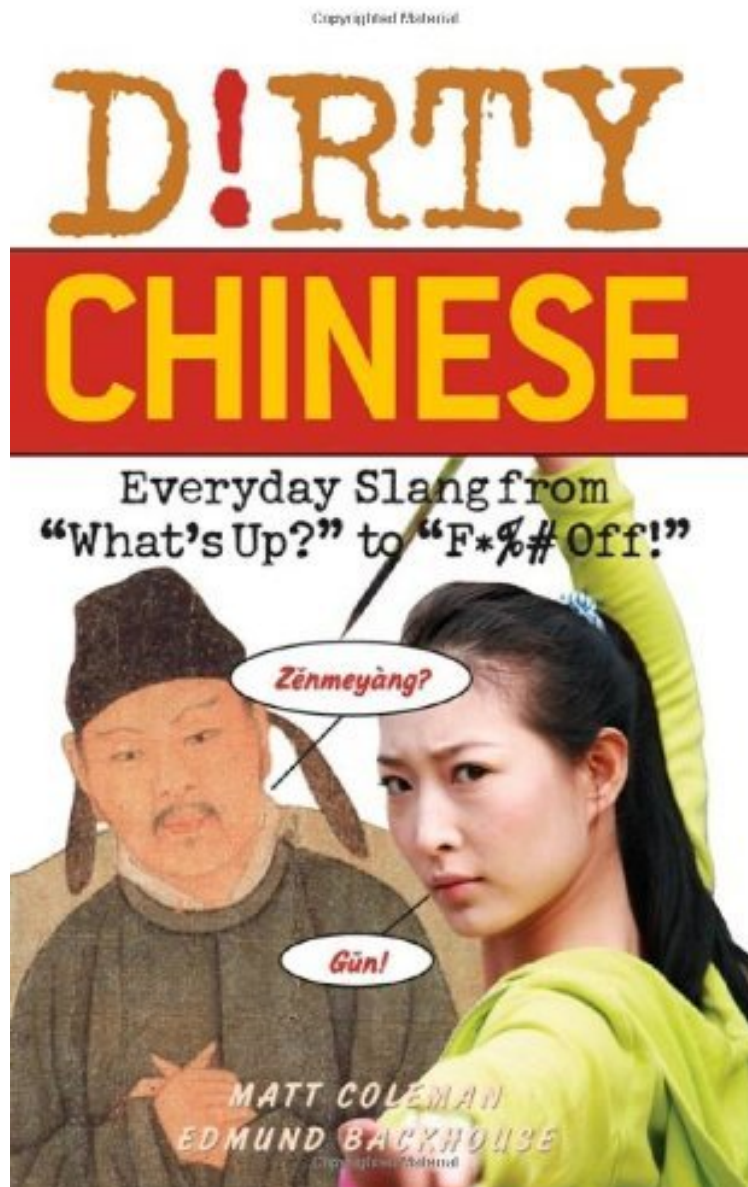

There are some useful sections with a handful of words you might have not yet picked up but mainly i feel like the voab it offers is very basic and only turned into slang by adding a TMD or something similar in front. If you have a reasonable understanding of Mandarin then there is little of value here. It does however offer (short) descriptions of various Chinese cultural phenomenons but does so in the somewhat condesending way many expats come to view China in after having stayed for a length of time.Meant as a joke or bought just to pass time on a flight (like I did) it is ok. I will admit I did get a few smirks and even a couple of new words out of it. But on the whole the contents of this book can no more be called slang than a "fucking apple" can be called slang for "apple." Hence 3 stars.
