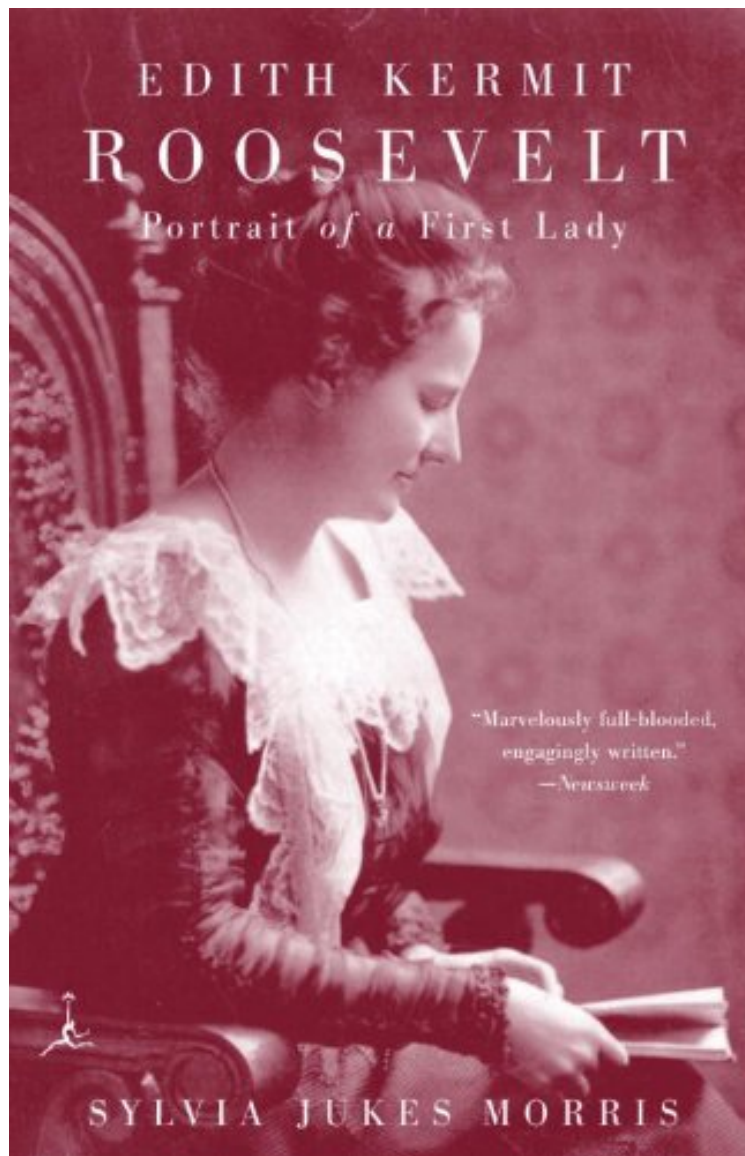

This one is focused on his wife, but TR is always involved. Since all TR books stop in 1919, here is a good opportunity to get information about TR's legacy, the time after his death. TR and his family are quite remarkable. Besides, the authors' husband has his new book on TR "Theodore Rex" being published on 20 November 2001.
